As always, I like to share the deep traditions and meaning of our Church. As we continue the season of Lenten. What does it mean for us as Catholics and what are we to follow? Are your families preparing for Lenten?

Here is more information regarding what is so important for us as Catholics to contemplate and follow.

As we continue this Lenten journey, why is it that we fast during this season?

Per the USCCB

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

Members of the Eastern Catholic Churches are to observe the particular law of their own *sui iuris* Church. A Reflection on Lenten Fasting

If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil (on Holy Saturday night) as the "paschal fast" to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate his Resurrection more readily.

During **Lent**, which is the **40 days** leading up to **Easter**, Catholics engage in practices such as **fasting** and **abstinence**. Here's why:

- Spiritual Preparation: Lent is a time of prayer, contemplation, and spiritual self-discipline. It serves
 as a preparation for Easter, which celebrates the Resurrection of Christ, the greatest holy day in the
 Christian calendar.
- Imitating Christ: Lent lasts 40 days to mirror the 40 days that Jesus spent fasting in the desert before beginning His public ministry. By imitating this period of spiritual discipline, Catholics prepare for the celebration of Christ's triumph over sin and death



4. Biblical Basis:

- O Fasting: Christ expected His disciples to fast (Matthew 9:14-15) and provided instructions on how to do so (Matthew 6:16-18). Catholics follow this pattern by holding a partial fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- O **Abstinence**: In Daniel 10:2-3, Daniel abstained from delicacies, meat, and wine for three weeks. Catholics similarly abstain from eating meat on Fridays during Lent, with fish being an exception (symbolic of Christ).
- 5. **Ash Wednesday**: The practice of having ashes applied to the forehead has biblical parallels. Putting ashes on one's head was a common expression of mourning (1 Samuel 13:19, Esther 4:1, Isaiah 61:3). Catholics receive the sign of the cross made with ashes to mourn Christ's suffering on the cross and their own sins.

Remember, Lent is not just about giving up something; it's a time for **spiritual growth**, **reflection**, and drawing closer to God


There will no Mass on Thursday

Let's remember that as Catholics, the importance of attending Sunday Mass. At Mass we stand at mystically at the foot of the cross and witness for ourselves the same self-sacrifice of Jesus, in an unbloody manner. Mass is a celebration of this sacrifice. It is the active participation of all that come together in the place of worship.

3nd Sunday of Lent 1st Reading: EX 17:3-7 Psalms: 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9

2nd Reading: Rom5: 1-2, 5-8 Gospel : Jn 4:5-42

While these are wonderful reflections, please remember that they are not to be a substitute for the wonderful sermons of Father or Deacon Kirk at Mass.



This week's Gospel is the Woman the Well and is one of my favorite Gospel readings. Here Jesus tells the woman "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst: the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up in eternal life." The woman said to him, "sir, give me this water so that I may not be thirsty or have to keep coming her to draw water." Are you ready to drink His water?

As always, I try to find wonderful reflections for this week's Gospel reading. I let the Holy Spirit guide me. This week what we can learn from the Gospel reading of the Woman of the well. To learn more please use the hyperlinks for additional information

The story of the nameless Samaritan woman at the well, recorded only in the Gospel of John, is a revealing one, full of many truths and powerful lessons for us today. The story of the woman at the well follows on the heels of the account of Jesus' interaction with Nicodemus, a Pharisee and prominent member of the Jewish Sanhedrin (<u>John 3:1–21</u>). In <u>John 4:4–42</u> we read about Jesus' conversation with a lone Samaritan woman who had come to get water from a well (known as Jacob's well) located about a half mile from the city of Sychar in Samaria.

This was an extraordinary woman. She was a <u>Samaritan</u>, a race of people that the Jews utterly despised as having no claim on their God, and she was an outcast and looked down upon by her own people. This is evidenced by the fact that she came alone to draw water from the community well when, during biblical times, drawing water and chatting at the well was the social highpoint of a woman's day. However, this woman was ostracized and marked as immoral, an unmarried woman living openly with the sixth in a series of men.

The story of the woman at the well teaches us that God loves us in spite of our bankrupt lives. God values us enough to actively seek us, to welcome us to intimacy, and to rejoice in our worship. As a result of Jesus' conversation, only a person like the Samaritan woman, an outcast from her own people, could understand what this means. To be wanted, to be cared for when no one, not even herself, could see anything of value in her—this is grace indeed.

But there are many other valuable truths we glean from this story. We learn that:

1) Only through Jesus can we obtain and receive eternal life: "Jesus answered, 'Everyone who drinks this water

- will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (John 4:13–14; cf. John 14:6).
- 2) Jesus' ministering to those outcasts of the Jewish society (the Samaritans) reveals that all people are valuable to God and that Jesus desires that we demonstrate love to everyone . . . including even our enemies (<u>John 4:7–9; Matthew 5:44</u>).
 - 3) Jesus is the Messiah (<u>John 4:25–26</u>; <u>1:41</u>; <u>Matthew 27:22</u>; <u>Luke 2:11</u>).
 - 4) Those who worship God, worship Him in spirit and truth (<u>John 4:23–24</u>; <u>Psalm 145:18</u>).
- 5) Our testimony about Jesus is a powerful tool in leading others to believe in Him: "Many of the Samaritans from that town believed in him because of the woman's testimony, 'He told me everything I ever did.' So when the Samaritans came to him, they urged him to stay with them, and he stayed two days. And because of his words many more became believers. They said to the woman, 'We no longer believe just because of what you said; now we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this man really is the Savior of the world" (John 4:39–42).

Additionally, we learn from Jesus' dialogue with the woman at the well three absolute truths about salvation:

- 1) Salvation comes only to those who recognize their desperate need for the spiritual life they do not have. <u>Living</u> water can be obtained only by those who recognize that they are spiritually thirsty.
- 2) Salvation comes only to those who confess and repent of their sin and desire forgiveness. Before this immoral woman could embrace the Savior, she had to concede the full burden of her sins.
- 3) Salvation comes only to those who take hold of Jesus as their Messiah. For the absolute truth is that salvation is found in no one else (John 14:6; Acts 4:12).



Each week I include this week's Scripture to be shared for children who may be too young to attend the program.

Theme Jesus satisfies our thirst.

Object A bottled sports drink; A cup or small bottle of water for each child

Scripture John 4:5-34

Most of you probably play some kind of sports. Raise your hand if you play sports. (Pause.) What kind of sports do you play? (Allow responses.)

Whether you play sports or just play hard, you know that when you're exercising, it's very important to take in plenty of liquids. (Give each child a cup or bottle of water. Tell children that when they hear the word "water," they are to take a sip of their water.)

The question is: What kind of liquids should you drink?

Ordinary water, (pause) of course, is a good choice, but when you go to the store, (Hold up the sports drink) the shelves are full of all kinds of sports drinks, energy drinks, and flavored water (pause). It's hard to know what's best.

The advertisement for one popular brand of sports drink says, "It's better than water (pause), juice, or any other drink. It gives your body what it is thirsty for! It gets you going and keeps you going."

Wow! They have me convinced, but one thing I've noticed: In all the claims made by sports drinks, not once have they ever claimed that if you would drink their product, you would *NEVER* be thirsty again. If somebody had

something that would do that, they would really have something, wouldn't they? Well, Jesus claimed to have that very thing!

One day Jesus was walking through a town in Samaria. He was hot and tired so he sat down beside a well to rest. A woman came to the well to get some water (pause) and Jesus asked her if she would give him a drink.

The woman was surprised that Jesus spoke to her because Jews would not usually speak to Samaritans.

Jesus told her that He could give her living water! (pause)

She didn't understand what He was talking about so she said, "You don't even have anything to get water in, (pause) how can you give me living water?" (pause)


Then Jesus said, "Whoever drinks from the water (pause) from this well will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water (pause) I give him will never thirst again."

Wow! Water (pause) that would satisfy your thirst so you would never be thirsty again! Jesus wasn't talking about our thirst for water from a well. (pause) He was talking about our thirst for God. The Bible teaches us that we have a thirst in our heart for the living God. And that is a thirst that only Jesus can satisfy. So when we have Jesus in our heart, He satisfies our thirst for God and we will never thirst again! Jesus is life! Drink it up!

Dear Lord, You have given us Jesus, the Living Water. (pause) May we drink of Your Living Water (pause) so we will never thirst again. In Jesus' name, amen.
