As always, I like to share the deep traditions and meaning of our Church. As we begin the season of Lenten. What does it mean for us as Catholics and what are we to follow? Are your families preparing for Lenten?

Here is more information regarding what is so important for us as Catholics to contemplate and follow.

As we continue this Lenten journey, why is prayer an important part of the Lenten Journey? Prayer is 1 of the 3 pillars for Lent,

- Prayer is an important part of Christianity.
- Prayer is one of the three pillars of Lent.
- Prayer is a way of communicating with God and growing in a relationship with him.
- Many different ways of praying exist.

Prayer is essential to the everyday spiritual life of a Christian. But during Lent, when Christians are supposed to focus more on God, it becomes even more important to them.

Prayer is one of the three pillars of Lent, but it is a common practice throughout the Church year.

Prayer is a conversation with God,

Prayer is to grow deeper in a relationship with God.

"We really do depend on God, in some ways for everything,"

Many times, throughout the Gospel, Jesus deliberately took time to go off and pray to God.

"That's what Jesus did in his experiences leading up to the Passion,"

When he desired to speak to God, Jesus often prayed alone.

"It's almost as if he needs that prayer as a way of nurturing himself spiritually,"

When Jesus went into the Garden of Gethsemane to pray just before his arrest, he asked his disciples to pray as well. The Disciples fell asleep instead of praying.

Too often, Christians do that instead of focusing on God, Lent is a time to try to pay more attention to prayer, she said. She said we need to wake up.

When it comes to prayer, sometimes we do the talking, and sometimes we do the listening.

Very often, it's the silence that gets you to think more about what you're asking God for, and you begin to think about it in different ways,

Even if he seems silent, God does answer prayer, said Galassi. You may not get the answer you wanted, but that's OK because God just answered it in a better way,

"You need to be open to God's answer, not just your answer,"

As believers have tried to hear God better while praying, many different methods of prayer have developed. All the different methods get to the same place,

The Lenten devotional book says vocal prayer involves using a set prayer, such as the Our Father, while scriptural prayer refers to slowly reading a passage of Scripture and opening oneself to God's words.


Participating with other believers in the rituals of the Church is liturgical prayer, according to the book.

Other forms of prayer also exist.

St. Ignatius believed that being in a place where prayer comes easily can be best,

"Even if it's five seconds, Jesus heard it anyway."



This week I found 2 short reflections for these weeks Gospel

This reflection can from Saint Benedict's Catholic Church

This passage is a part of Jesus' conversation with Nicodemus.

Jesus says that just as Moses lifted up the bronze snake for healing, the Son of Man must also be lifted up to give eternal life to all who believe in Him.

God loved the world so much that He sent His only Son so that whoever believes in Him will have eternal life.

Jesus did not come into the world to bring judgement. Yet everyone who rejects Him rejects the light and loves darkness. Therefore, they are judged by their actions for loving evil and rejecting truth.

What it means for us

Jesus came into the world to save sinners. Everybody is invited to the Feast of Salvation. There are no prerequisites for eternity.

But we have to choose. Jesus is the way to eternal life. If we reject that way we say that we prefer the darkness, the way of Satan.

So, in coming to save the world, Jesus condemns those who reject His way.

There is a very sharp line between Heaven and hell, salvation and damnation. That line goes right through Jesus.

The question God will ask to judge us is: Do you follow the way of Jesus?

Lord Jesus, today I turn from my sin, and I lay down my life to follow you. Amen.

[John 3:14-21](#) (NIV)

“Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up,[a] 15 that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him.”[b]

16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. 17 For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. 18 Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God’s one and only Son. 19 This is the verdict: Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil. 20 Everyone who does evil hates the light, and will not come into the light for fear that their deeds will be exposed. 21 But whoever lives by the truth comes into the light, so that it may be seen plainly that what they have done has been done in the sight of God.“

How can you know and share eternal life?

- **The Gift of Eternal Life has a cost of Atonement (forgiveness of sins)**

John 3:14-15 (Son of Man, not sum of man) What Jesus did, not what you do.

- **The Gift of Eternal Life is a loving choice**

John 3:16 (God loves us and chose to redeem those who would seek after God)

- **The Gift of Eternal Life is a limited choice**

John 3:17-18 (Everyone must choose life or death, there is no third option)

- **Choose in your Life to Embrace and Share the light of Jesus Christ**

John 3:19-21 (Choose to follow the light of Christ knowing some will reject Jesus and you)

Reflection questions on the gift of eternal life:

- ***How do I need to choose life?***

– How can I seek forgiveness for my sins?

– How can I show respect for other people's choices while disagreeing?

– How can I share Jesus with others?



Each week I include this week's Scripture to be shared for children who may be too young to attend the program.

Theme :God's love is immeasurable.

Object A measuring cup; a tape measure; a watch

Scripture: John 3:14-21

Children's Sermon: Measuring God's Love (John 3:14-21)

One of my favorite Bible verses begins, "For God so loved the world" (John 3:16). I was thinking about that verse and wondering just how great God's love is and how we could measure it. This morning I brought several things that we often use to measure stuff. I thought they might help us measure God's love.

Sometimes we measure ingredients. If I were making some cookies, which of these would I use to make sure that I put in exactly the right amount of flour, sugar, and milk? (Allow kids to pick between the measuring cup, a tape measure, and a watch.) That's right, we would use a measuring cup for cookies, but I wonder if we might use a measuring cup to measure God's love? The Bible says, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want....my cup runneth over" (Psalm 23:1,5). Well, if our cup runs over with God's love, I guess we couldn't use a measuring cup to measure it.

If we were building something, which of these would I use to measure the length, width, and height of different things? (Allow kids to pick between the measuring cup, a tape measure, and a watch.) That's right, a tape measure, but I wonder if we might use a tape measure to measure God's love? The Bible

tells us that God's love is higher than the heavens (Psalm 108:4). If God's love is higher than the heavens, I don't think we could use a tape measure to measure it, could we?

Which of these would I use to measure time? (Allow kids to pick between the measuring cup, a tape measure, and a watch.) We use a watch to measure time. There will probably be some people here this morning who will use their watches to measure how long the pastor's sermon lasts. I wonder if we could use a watch to measure how long God's love will last. The Bible tells us that God's love is from everlasting to everlasting (Psalm 103:17). Wow! If God's love is from everlasting to everlasting, I guess we couldn't measure it with a watch.


"For God so loved the world, that He gave His one and only Son that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). How do you measure love like that? We can't measure it. We don't need to, but we do need to experience it.

My prayer for you today is, "That you may understand how wide, how long, how high, and how deep His love really is. May you experience it, though it is so great you will never fully understand it" (Ephesians 3:18-19).

Dear God, we thank You for Your love—a love so great that You gave Your one and only Son so that we could have eternal life. In Jesus' name, amen.
